Dreams and Deconstructions Sandy Craig, 1980 *Dreams and Deconstructions* is an illustrated account of the development of alternative theatre in Britain over the past 20 years or so. It assesses the achievements of political theatre, the impact of feminism, the expansion of community and ethnic theatre, and the growth of the important but often neglected areas of theatre in education and children's theatre. The book also surveys the work of the performance art groups and the actor based workshops, looks at lunch time theatre, the new fringe venues and the regional reps, and considers the benefits and constraints of public patronage. Significantly it turns the spotlight on that new generation of angry young playwrights to emerge after the watershed year of 1968. Writers such as Howard Brenton, David Hare, Caryl Churchill and David Edgar whose work is central to any discussion of alternative theatre. Alternative theatre has redefined the relationship between theatre and society and has been openly politically critical of the social democratic process. It has challenged the traditional ideologies of the established commercial and subsidized theatres and has attempted to find different audiences and new forms of dramatic expressions. *Dreams and Deconstruction* is the first book to seek to understand and analyse that process of redefinition which has been arguable the more exciting development in British theatre in recent years.
