

Bowie, 2012-01-30 LENARD C BOWIE DMA ASSOCIATE alike PROFESSOR OF MUSIC RETIRED THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH FLORIDA JACKSONVILLE FLORIDA Dr Lenard C Bowie has developed an enviable reputation as a consummate musician He is a classical trumpet artist accomplished band director effective music administrator skilled lecturer and publi shed author As an author Bowie s expertise in several fields of endeavor has been documented through the following subjects as published in the professional music journals indicated Solving Problems of Young Trumpet Players published in the Music Educators National Journal December 1979 a critical review of Black University Marching Bands in the 80 s published by The Marching Band January 198 1 and the Proceedings of an Informal Research Conference whose mission was to document the extent to which African American music courses were offered in Florida's Public Schools was published by the Florida Music Educator June 2002 As an undergraduate Bowie was plagued bymany questions concerning the absence of formal instruction in the music of his people especially when considering the fact that there were only two authentic types of American music that of the American Indians and that of African Americans with African American Music being the most important of the two Bowie's search for answers to his probing questions began when he enrolled in Professor Willie Ruffs course in Black Music as a graduate student at Yale University in 1974 This course opened Bowie's eyes ears and mind to many of his here to fore unanswered questions including the extent to which African music traditions are practiced in African American Music today and the impact that African American Music has made on the social political economic and religious climates of modern American Society After graduating from Yale with a Master of Musical Arts Degree in 1976 Bowie struck out on a mission to enlarge on what he had learned about African American Music This mission brought him in contact with a wealth of information through independent study of numerous publications and documentaries lectures festivals concerts and personal contacts with scholars who were or have become major players in the research dissemination performance and composition of African American Music Some of these scholars include former colleagues Dr Oily W Wilson composer and Chair of Composition at UCLA Berkeley Samuel Floyd Founder and Director of the Center for Black Music Research found at Fisk University now housed at ColumbiaCollege Chicago Dr AaronHorne AfricanAmericanMusic Biographer and Dean of Fine Arts Winston Salem University North Caro lina Aramentha Adams Hummings Founder and Director of the Gateways Music Festival initiated at the North Carolina School of the Arts now housed at the East man School of Music in Rochester New York Operatic Tenor and Music Educator the late Dr William A Brown Others include Dr Portia Maultsby Professor of Music at Indiana University Dr Dena Epstein Retired Music Librarian Archival Researcher and Author Chicago Dr Rene Boyer White Professor of Music Education College Conservatory of Music The University of Cincinnati and Dr John Smith Dean of Fine Arts The University of South Florida at Tampa During the first of Dr Bowie's two terms as Music Department Chair at The University of North Florida he was afforded an opportunity to apply and distribute his long sought know ledge The opportunity came in the form of a Mill ion Dollar Endowment from the Koger Company to develop programs of study in American Music The response of the faculty to the endowmentwas to institute two programs a Jazz Studies Program and a program in African American Music The Jazz Studies Program has become nationally recognized for outstanding achievements in jazz theory history and performance The latter program designed and developed by Bowie was chall Afro-American Life, History and Culture ,1985 Guide to African-American History Evelyn Brooks Higginbotham, 2001 This massive guide sponsored by the W E B Du Bois Institute for Afro American Research at Harvard University and compiled by renowned experts offers a compendium of information and interpretation on over 500 years of black experience in America Perspectives on American Music since 1950 James R. Ogren, 1992-06-04 Born of African rhythms the spiritual call and response and other American musical traditions jazz was by the 1920s the dominant influence on this country's popular music Writers of the Harlem Renaissance Langston Hughes Claude McKay Zora Neale

Hurston and the Lost Generation Malcolm Cowley F Scott Fitzgerald and Gertrude Stein along with many other Americans celebrated it both as an expression of black culture and as a symbol of rebellion against American society But an equal number railed against it Whites were shocked by its raw emotion and sexuality and blacks considered it devil s music and criticized it for casting a negative light on the black community In this illuminating work Kathy Ogren places this controversy in the social and cultural context of 1920s America and sheds new light on jazz s impact on the nation as she traces its dissemination from the honky tonks of New Orleans New York and Chicago to the clubs and cabarets of such places as Kansas City and Los Angeles and further to the airwayes Ogren argues that certain characteristics of jazz notably the participatory nature of the music its unusual rhythms and emphasis gave it a special resonance for a society undergoing rapid change Those who resisted the changes criticized the new music those who accepted them embraced jazz In the words of conductor Leopold Stowkowski Jazz had come to stay because it was an expression of the times of the breathless energetic superactive times in which we were living it was useless to fight against it Numerous other factors contributed to the growth of jazz as a popular music during the 1920s The closing of the Storyville section of New Orleans in 1917 was a signal to many jazz greats to move north and west in search of new homes for their music Ogren follows them to such places as Chicago New York and San Francisco and using the musicians own words as often as possible tells of their experiences in the clubs and cabarets Prohibition ushered in by the Volstead Act of 1919 sent people out in droves to gang controlled speak easies many of which provided jazz entertainment And the 1920s economic boom which made music readily available through radio and the phonograph record created an even larger audience for the new music But Ogren maintains that jazz itself through its syncopated beat improvisation and blue tonalities spoke to millions Based on print media secondary sources biographies and autobiographies and making extensive use of oral histories The Jazz Revolution offers provocative insights into both early From Spirituals to Symphonies Helen Walker-Hill, 2007 Exploding the assumption that black iazz and American culture women s only important musical contributions have been in folk jazz and pop Helen Walker Hill s unique study provides a carefully researched examination of the history and scope of musical composition by African American women composers from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries Focusing on the effect of race gender and class From Spirituals to Symphonies notes the important role played by individual personalities and circumstances in shaping this underappreciated category of American art The study also provides in depth exploration of the backgrounds experiences and musical compositions of eight African American women including Margaret Bonds Undine Smith Moore and Julia Perry who combined the techniques of Western art music with their own cultural traditions and individual gifts Despite having gained national and international recognition during their lifetimes the contributions of many of these women are today forgotten Sourcebook for Research in Music Phillip Crabtree, Donald H.
