Krabbe, 1995-01-01 This book develops a logical analysis of dialogue in which two or more parties attempt to advance their own interests It includes a classification of the major types of dialogues and a discussion of several important informal fallacies The authors define the concept of commitment in a way that makes it useful in evaluating arguments In traditional logic a proposition is either true or false and that is the end of it In this new framework an arguer can be held to his or her commitments in some cases but in other cases he or she can retract them without violating any rule of the dialogue Commitment in Dialogue studies the conditions under which commitments should be held or may be retracted within an argument An extensive case study of a discussion in medical ethics is used to bring together two traditions or schools of thought that had not been integrated previously the rigorous Lorenzen school of formal logic and the more permissive Hamblin style dialogue It introduces these methods of evaluation and offers guidelines for analyzing the text of discourse The book could be used in both intermediate and advanced courses in informal logic argumentation and

critical thinking but it is accessible to the reader with no background in these fields as well Each chapter is summarized and additional problems to be solved are presented
